# Acer buergerianum

Trident Maple is a small- to medium-sized, deciduous tree from Asia with a rounded, branching form, it is tolerant of a range of soil moistures and textures. It is also tolerant of wind, salt, drought, air pollution, and soil compaction.



## Acer campestra 'Metro Gold'

Hedge Maple

Acer campestra is very tolerant of air pollution, alkaline, clay, dry, and compacted soils. It is a good street tree that casts dense shade and works well under utility lines because it can be severely pruned. This tree supports pollinators and birds and makes an excellent shade tree for a pollinator garden or a recreational play area.



## Acer x freemanii 'Autumn Blaze'

This hybrid of silver and red maples takes the best of both parents. It boasts superior fall color, vigorous growth rates, insect and disease resistance and a wide range of adaptability. An excellent lawn, park, or street tree.



# Acer x f. 'Autumn Fantasy'

A vigorous growing Maple with an oval shape. The spring foliage emerges with reddish tints, matures to green and is ruby red in fall. It is nearly "fruitless" making it a cleaner tree for placement near driveways, structures and patios.



## Acer x f. Armstrong Gold®

A special selection of Maple with a narrow stature and a compact growth habit. The dense green foliage turns shades of gold to orange in the fall. It is an excellent choice for street plantings, screening and for small yards. Acer rubrum Armstrong Gold® has bright golden orange fall foliage on a very tight upright form. Besides having good tolerance for a wide range of environmental conditions (as do Red Maples in general), Armstrong Gold® makes an excellent street tree because of the dense columnar form.



## Nyssa sylvatica 'Wildfire'

This tree is an excellent choice to support wildlife in the landscape. However, it should be sited in a permanent location because its long taproot makes it difficult to transplant later. It is tolerant of drought, heat, dry and wet soils, and is moderately salt tolerant. It withstands wind, ice, and salt spray in coastal locations. Wildfire Black Gum is primarily valued in the landscape for its distinctively pyramidal habit of growth. It has forest green deciduous foliage which emerges red in spring. The glossy pointy leaves turn an outstanding crimson in the fall. The furrowed black bark adds an interesting dimension to the landscape.



## Syringa Reticulata

Japanese Tree Lilac

Japanese Tree Lilac is a small tree, reaching a height of about 20 to 30 feet with a 15-foot-spread, with huge clusters of creamy white flowers in early summer. With spreading branches and an oval to rounded crown, it has a Christmas tree shape, wider at the base and narrower at the top. Japanese Tree Lilac is tolerant of urban conditions, growing in poor clay or alkaline soil. It is often planted as a street tree, particularly in areas with overhead power lines.



#### Zelkova serrata 'Wireless'

## Japanese Zelkova

A broadly spreading vase shape makes this an ideal street tree and it fits into other spaces where height is a factor. It can withstand high temperatures and yet still provide good shade for the cars beneath. As a bonus, its foliage turns beautiful red shades in fall. This is a tough, drought tolerant tree that is well-suited for urban sites.



## Zelkova serrata 'City Sprite'

Compact, dense, and semi-dwarf, this is the perfect little tree for tight urban spaces. Summer foliage appears brighter green than typical Zelkova. Short internodes, fine textured foliage, and a tidy growth habit promise a low maintenance city tree. This tree is low maintenance but offers formal grace. It is strong with a dense trunk that holds up to wind and snow. It also features outstanding drought tolerance once established. The City Sprite makes a great substitute for the American Elm. It is resistant to Dutch Elm disease and is remarkably hardy.



# Ulmus p.arvifolia 'Allee'

A fast growing yet, tough, durable tree sure to grace any landscape. The beautiful upright and arching form is accentuated by exfoliating bark in shades of gray with orangey brown. Also, it has good disease resistance and makes an excellent shade tree.

#### Frontier Elm

The Frontier elm is a tough, hybrid Elm that is a good choice for residential Hedhjlandscapes and along city streets. The Frontier elm has good resistance to Dutch Elm disease and elm yellows. It has an oval to vase shaped silhouette, a narrow stature and long-lasting burgundy fall color.
